## Dental Month: 15% off all Dentals booked for month of February

Taking care of your dog and cats teeth is important for their health. Bringing them to the veterinarian regularly can help detect early stages of dental diseases. Not taking care of any potential problems your pet may have can lead to different health problems if not caught early. Some of these can include:

*\*Heart disease-causing bacteria to attach to the heart valves causing inflammation to the lining of the heart chambers and valves causing a disease called endocarditis.*

*\*Lung disease-with each breath your pet is inhaling bacteria and toxins into the lungs which then enters the blood stream.*

*\*Kidney disease-chronic kidney failure could be a result of advanced dental disease.*

Bacteria from the advanced dental disease gets into the bloodstream and then gets into the internal organs causing damage to the liver, heart and kidneys that can be irreversible. There are many signs that can be seen in dental disease, such as the tartar building up on their teeth or your pet is uninterested in eating. But there are some signs that go unnoticed until the disease has progressed to a very bad state. Some of those signs can include a bad smell coming from your pet's mouth, which is the bacterium hoarding in their mouths that you smell. Your pet may also start pawing at their mouth from being in pain from a sore tooth. A sign that you may start to see when the situation gets too far along could be swelling below the eyes or near the pets check. Swelling can come from an infected tooth or from bacteria that have gathered under the gum line and are causing an infection.

Pet's mouths are used for much more than eating. They are used for licking their family members, playing with their toys and grooming themselves. It is important for them to have a clean feeling mouth so they can live a happy and comfortable life.



## Preventative Dental Care:

Pets need frequent routine dental care just besides the veterinarian looking inside the mouth once a year. We have a few tips to help you and your pet prevent dental disease.

*\*Routine dental cleanings should be done every 6 months to a year depending on how much tartar accumulates on your pet's teeth in between each cleaning.*

*\*Brush your pet's teeth one to two times a week to help remove the bacteria and top layer of tartar off the teeth.*

*\*Hard dental chews such as greenies and C.E.T. chews help break off hard tartar from the back molars.*

*\*Feed your pet a special diet that has a dental formula in it to help break down tartar and work with the natural enzymes in your pet's mouth to prevent tartar build up.*

*\*Feed your pet hard food and treats instead of soft. The chewing motion with the hard food causes friction when chewed that helps break up tartar.*
